# St. Martins Fair

*Come to sell or come to purchase—it's fun for everyone!*

St. Martins Fair takes place on St. Martins Road (CTH MM), from W. Forest Home Avenue to W. Church Street, the first Monday of every month (weather permitting) and Sunday and Monday of Labor Day weekend. (Please note that due to the W. St. Martins Road reconstruction project, the August 1st monthly fair will take place at Market Square located at W. Church and W. Franklin Streets.) Selling hours on the first Mondays of each month are 6 a.m. to 2 p.m.



**Labor Day weekend hours are Sunday, September 4th, 8 a.m. to 9 p.m., and Monday, September 5th, 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. All fair-area roads will be closed to vehicle traffic during the hours listed above during the Labor Day weekend fair.**

Vendors sell an assortment of merchandise including fruits, vegetables, arts, crafts, clothing, shoes, hardware and household items, pet supplies, cleaning supplies, gift items, dried flowers and arrangements, furniture, antiques, and other miscellaneous merchandise. Special music groups, including polka bands, also entertain the crowd throughout the Labor Day weekend event.

To sell or entertain at this fair, vendors and entertainers must obtain a permit from the City of Franklin. The permit entitles the holder to sell goods and services or operate entertainment or amusement for either a single space up to 15 feet of street frontage (available at Labor Day Fair only) or a space of over 15 feet and up to 30 feet of frontage at the fair; additional space after 30 feet is available for \$5 per extra foot. **Contact the City Clerk's Office at 414-425-7500 to purchase a permit or for additional information relating to the Fair.**

## 2016 Election Dates & Photo ID

**Partisan Primary: August 9 / General Election: November 8**  
**Polls Open: 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.**

**All Wisconsin voters must now show an acceptable photo ID before voting.** The following photo IDs are acceptable, even if they are recently expired (as long as the ID did not expire before November 4, 2014):

- A Wisconsin DOT-issued driver license, even if driving privileges are revoked or suspended.
- A Wisconsin DOT-issued ID card.
- A Wisconsin DOT-issued ID card or driver license without a photo issued under the religious exemption.
- A Military ID card issued by a U.S. uniformed service.
- A U.S. Passport.
- An ID card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin.



**The following IDs are also acceptable, but cannot be expired:**

- A veteran's photo ID card issued by the Veterans Health Administration of the Federal Department of Veterans Affairs.
- A Wisconsin driver license receipt or Wisconsin ID card receipt (valid for 45 days after it is issued).
- A Certificate of Naturalization that was issued not earlier than 2 years before the date of election.
- A photo ID card issued by a Wisconsin accredited university or college that contains date of issuance, signature of student, and an expiration date no later than two years after date of issuance. Also, it must be accompanied by a separate document that proves current enrollment.
- A citation or notice of intent to revoke or suspend a Wisconsin DOT-issued driver license that is dated within 60 days of the date of the election.

## Lock It or Lose It

It's that time of year again—THEFT SEASON! The weather is warmer and the thieves come out to play. Vehicles are targeted in driveways, parking lots, and while parked on the street. The majority of the theft occurs during the hours of darkness, but if a daytime opportunity knocks...they will take advantage of it.

Things thieves are looking for include unlocked car doors, keys, purses or wallets left in plain view on the seat or counsel, cell phones, iPods, computers, tablets, GPSs, coins or dollar bills left in cup holders, backpacks, and shopping bags implying you may have just been to the mall. If they can see it, they will break your window to get to it. In an effort to reduce this type of crime, the **Franklin Police Department** recommends the following:

- Keep your vehicle locked at ALL times and keep your valuables out of sight.
- Place purses and bags in the trunk before you leave, as thieves may be watching for this when you arrive.
- Remove garage door openers from the visor, as this is a point of entry into your home.
- Remove electronics and their holders from windshields.
- Park your vehicle in a well lit area.
- Report suspicious persons, vehicles, or activity when it is occurring.

## Fair Housing

As part of the requirement for the Milwaukee County Community Development Block Grant Program, the City is required to inform residents about its Fair Housing Ordinance, Chapter 125 of the City's Municipal Code. The intent of the Fair Housing Chapter is to prohibit discrimination in housing – that all persons have an equal opportunity for housing regardless of sex, race, color, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, handicap, sex, or marital status of the person maintaining a household, lawful source of income, age or ancestry. It is the duty of the City of Franklin to assist in the orderly prevention or removal of all discrimination in housing through the powers granted under the Wisconsin Statutes.

**Through this ordinance, no person shall discriminate by:**

- 1) Refusing to sell, lease, finance or contract to construct housing or by refusing to discuss the terms thereof;
- 2) Refusing to permit inspection or exacting different or more stringent price, terms of conditions for the sale, lease or rental of housing;
- 3) Refusing to finance or sell an unimproved residential lot or to construct a home or residence upon such lot; or
- 4) Publishing, circulating, issuing or displaying or causing to be published, circulated, issued or displayed any communication, notice, advertisement or sign in connection with the sale, financing, lease or rental of housing which states or indicates any discrimination in connection with housing.

Any person who violates any of the provisions of the Fair Housing Ordinance is subject to a penalty. Additional information or assistance can be obtained through the following agencies:

## Review of Ballpark Commons Development Proposal Continues

The City of Franklin has completed market and tax increment finance (TIF) district feasibility analyses of the Ballpark Commons development proposal, planned for the area around the Rock Sports Complex, 7900 Crystal Ridge Drive. The mixed-use project could include restaurants, retail shops, a hotel, office space, multi-family residential, a 4,000 spectator baseball stadium, and an indoor sports facility.

In their analysis, the City's TIF consultant, Ehlers & Associates, concluded that the tax revenue generated by the \$101 million (est. assessed value post-construction) development could support proposed TIF expenditures up to \$25.8 million. The increment funds used to pay for the expenditures would not exist but for the development (meeting a critical requirement of the Wisconsin TIF law) and could be used to pay for infrastructure, a developer incentive, and the City's cost to create and oversee the district.

An independent market analysis contracted from Melaniphy & Associates recommended the project "should be undertaken as a catalyst for residential, restaurant, recreational, and commercial development at this important intersection in Franklin." The report went on to say, "the mix of uses will create synergy and enhance absorption of all the other uses."

The City is now working with Ehlers to further evaluate project costs and revenues and to draft a TIF project plan. Prior to considering the TIF district, public notices will be made and hearings held. Common Council consideration is tentatively planned for September.

## Franklin Citizen Police Academy

Police Chief Rick Oliva has announced Class No. 20 of the Franklin Police Department Citizen Police Academy which begins Tuesday, September 6, for 12 consecutive weeks, and concludes on Tuesday, November 22, 2016.



Classes meet for 3 hours, Tuesday evenings from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., usually in the Franklin Police Department community classroom. Additionally, each graduate may participate in a ride-along with officers on the street.

The Franklin Police Department's mission is to establish and maintain a course of instruction for citizens to familiarize themselves with the operations of the Franklin Police Department and the profession of law enforcement. This 12-week academy presents an overview of all aspects of law enforcement such as patrol operations, traffic enforcement, investigations, SWAT, K-9 unit, dispatch/communications, fire and emergency medical services, and much more. Students will have an opportunity to present concerns and questions regarding public safety in the City and learn how citizens and the police can work together to fight crime in the community. Department employees present each session and interact with participants on a very approachable level.

### Applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Live or work in the Franklin community (preference is given to Franklin citizens).
- Submit a written application.
- Pass a background check (no felony convictions).
- Be 18 years of age (16 and 17 year olds may attend with a parent or guardian).

## Exit Drills In The Home (E.D.I.T.H.)

Now is the perfect time of the year to plan and practice **Exit Drills In The Home (E.D.I.T.H.)**. When was the last time your family sat down and talked about an emergency escape plan? Do you have an escape plan? What would happen if a fire were to strike your house today? Would your spouse, kids, and other family members in the house know what to do? Here are some tips to help develop an escape plan, commonly referred to in the fire service as E.D.I.T.H. or "Exit Drills in the Home".



- Plan for at least two ways out of every room.
- Have working smoke detectors in the house and know what the alarm sounds like.
- Have a common meeting spot outside for all occupants.
- Sleep with your doors closed.
- When you hear a smoke detector alarm, stay calm.
- Roll out of bed and stay low. Crawl to the nearest and easiest exit first.
- Feel the door with the back of your hand—if the door is cool, open the door slowly; if it is hot, go to the second exit.
- Once outside, go to your meeting place. Do not go back into the house for any reason.
- Call 911 from a cell phone or a neighbor's house.

After you call 911 and are at the meeting spot, wait for the firefighters to tell them either everyone is out or if someone is missing. This will help the firefighters with their job, either searching for the missing person or focusing on extinguishing the fire.

The most important part of this message is to **stay low and go**, know **two ways out** of each room, and once outside at the meeting spot, **never go back inside**. **Be safe and if you need help developing your EDITH plan, feel free to stop by the fire house or call 425-1420 for assistance.**
