City Development staff recommends approval of a resolution authorizing certain officials to accept a conservation easement for and as part of the review and approval of a site plan and natural resource special exception for construction of a pre-engineered metal building and associated parking and loading area, stormwater pond and protection of an existing wetland for property located at 9611 South 58<sup>th</sup> Street (Krones, Inc., Applicant).

The applicant is requesting two modifications from the City's standard conservation easement template:

1) The approved mitigation area is located next to the storm water pond. The proposed language below would allow the conservation easement area to be entered as necessary to allow for maintenance of the pond.

To enter protected area adjacent to the storm water pond illustrated on Exhibit B for pond maintenance purposes only. Any disturbed protected area resulting from maintenance activities of the pond shall be restored to its natural state by the Grantor.


2) The applicant is also proposing to mow the remaining wetland buffer and setback areas that are adjacent to the entrance of the building. As such, the italicized language below has been added to the easement document.

Excavate, dredge, grade, mine, drill, or change the topography of the land or its natural condition in any manner, including any cutting or removal of vegetation, except for the removal of dead or diseased trees, the mowing of the existing lawn area in the remaining wetland buffer and setback area, and the construction and maintenance of the mitigation measures as shall be approved by the City of Franklin;



WHEREAS, the Plan Commission having approved a Site Plan and Natural Resource Special Exception upon the application of Krones, Inc., on December 7, 2017, and the Plan Commission having conditioned approval thereof in part upon Common Council approval of a Conservation Easement to protect the wetland and wetland buffer on the site; and

WHEREAS, §15-7.0102G. and §15-7.0103Q. of the Unified Development Ordinance requires the submission of a Natural Resource Protection Plan in the Site Plan and Natural Resource Special Exception review process and the Unified Development Ordinance requires conservation easements to be imposed for natural resource features identified within such Plan to protect such features, all as part of the approval process for a Site Plan and Natural Resource Special Exception; and

WHEREAS, the City Engineering Department, Department of City Development and the Office of the City Attorney having reviewed the proposed Conservation Easement and having recommended approval thereof to the Common Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Franklin, Wisconsin, that the Conservation Easement submitted by Krones, Inc., in the form and content as annexed hereto, be and the same is hereby approved; and the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to execute such Easement as evidence of the consent to and acceptance of such easement by the City of Franklin.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Clerk be and the same is hereby directed to obtain the recording of the Conservation Easement in the Office of the Register of Deeds for Milwaukee County, Wisconsin.

## **CONSERVATION EASEMENT**

## Krones Training Center

This Conservation easement is made by and between the CITY OF FRANKLIN, a municipal corporation of the State of Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to as "Grantee," and Krones Incorporated, hereinafter referred to as "Grantor," and shall become effective upon the recording of this Grant of Conservation Easement, together with the Acceptance following, with the Office of the Register of Deeds for Milwaukee County, pursuant to §700.40(2)(b) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

### WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, Grantor is the owner in fee simple of certain real property, located within Parcel 1 of Certified Survey Map No. 4543 and Parcel 1 of Certified Survey Map No.4695 in the Northwest 1/4 of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 26, Town 5 North, Range 21 East, in the City of Franklin, Milwaukee County, Wisconsin, described in Exhibit A and Exhibit B attached hereto and hereby made a part hereof (protected property); and

WHEREAS, the Grantor desires and intends that the natural elements and the ecological and aesthetic values of the protected property including, without limitation the wetland, wetland buffer and mitigation area, and refer to Exhibit A and Exhibit B by CJ Engineering dated February 12, 2018, which is located in the office of the Department of City Development, be preserved and maintained by the continuation of land use that will not interfere with or substantially disrupt the natural elements or the workings of natural systems; and

WHEREAS, Grantee is a "holder", as contemplated by §700.41(1)(b)1. of the Wisconsin Statutes, whose purposes include, while exercising regulatory authority granted to it, *inter alia*, under §62.23 and §236.45 of the Wisconsin Statutes, the conservation of land, natural areas, open space, and water areas; and

WHEREAS, the Grantor and Grantee, by the conveyance to the Grantee of the conservation easement on, over, and across the protected property, desire to conserve the natural values thereof and prevent the use or development of the protected property for any purpose or in any manner inconsistent with the terms of this conservation easement; and

WHEREAS, the Grantee is willing to accept this conservation easement subject to the reservations and to the covenants, terms, conditions, and restrictions set out herein and imposed hereby;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Grantor, for and in consideration of the foregoing recitations and of the mutual covenants, terms, conditions, and restrictions subsequently contained, and as an absolute and unconditional dedication, does hereby grant and convey unto the Grantee a conservation easement in perpetuity on, over, and across the protected property.

Grantee's rights hereunder shall consist solely of the following:

- 1. To view the protected property in its natural, scenic, and open condition;
- 2. To enforce by proceeding at law or in equity the covenants subsequently set forth, including, and in addition to all other enforcement proceedings, proceedings to obtain all penalties and remedies set forth under Division 15-9.0500 of the Unified Development Ordinance of the City of Franklin, as amended from time to time, any violation of the covenants subsequently set forth being and constituting a violation of such Unified Development Ordinance, as amended from time to time, or such local applicable ordinance as may be later adopted or in effect to enforce such covenants or the purposes for which they are made, it being agreed that there shall be no waiver or forfeiture of the Grantee's right to insure compliance with the covenants and conditions of this grant by reason of any prior failure to act; and
- 3. To enter the protected property at all reasonable times for the purpose of inspecting the protected property to determine if the Grantor is complying with the covenants and conditions of this grant.

To enter protected area adjacent to the storm water pond illustrated on Exhibit B for pond maintenance purposes only. Any disturbed protected area resulting from maintenance activities of the pond shall be restored to its natural state by the Grantor.







## Background

The Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) was last published with adopted revisions on December 19, 2014. Since that time, there have been about fifteen amendments to the UDO. Unlike the Municipal Code, the City does not have a system in place to update the UDO when amendments occur.

As a result, staff individually has to manually track changes. Furthermore, businesses, developers and their consultants often review and draft plans based on obsolete ordinances.

## **Proposed Solution**

Department of City Development staff is requesting to proceed with a contract with General Code, LLC to codify and integrate the UDO into General Code's eCode360 online platform. General Code is the same company and format the City uses for the Municipal Code.

Once the UDO has been converted to eCode360, the Department of City Development will develop a process to ensure all amendments are sent to General Code to be codified into the UDO. These updates will be billed separately. The cost of updates depends upon the scope of work and specific amendments. Moving forward, the Department of City Development budget must be adjusted to account for these updates. Based upon billing information for the Municipal Code, staff anticipates an annual budget request of \$2,000.

Note that this proposal/agreement will:

- keep the same numbering system within the UDO;
- publish it as a separate volume from the Municipal Code, which will be Volume 1 and remain unchanged;
- not codify Planned Development District ordinances;
- include two hard copies of the updated UDO; and
- not increase the City's current annual maintenance fee for eCode, which is \$1,195.00.

The estimated conversion time is 10 to 12 weeks following the City signing the agreement and General Code receipt of the necessary deliverables outlined in the attached proposal/agreement. Payment will be invoiced upon the posting of the UDO in eCode360.


Also note the proposal is dated April 14, 2017 and states that it is valid for 6 months. Staff confirmed that the attached proposal is still valid.



# Situation Analysis



#### **Prior Codification**

The Code of the City of Franklin was originally published in 1998. Since then it has been supplemented 54 times, most recently in 2017, including legislation through Supplement No. 54/Ordinance No. 2016-2255 (currently in process). Until now, it has included the 1998 Unified Development Ordinance only by reference.

#### Source Materials

The City of Franklin will provide to General Code the following, which will be used as the source materials for the project:

A hard copy of the City's 1998 Unified Development Ordinance, as updated with adopted revisions on December 19, 2014

This proposal only takes into account an estimated 545 pages of legislation submitted for review, which will be included within the scope of this project. General Code requests that the City set up a process during the project to routinely send any new legislation upon adoption. These additional materials will be included in the Code after the initial publication and will be billed separately. An estimate of the applicable charges is available upon request.







#### BACKGROUND

The Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission is partnering with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) and the Bay-Lake, East Central Wisconsin, and Northwest Wisconsin Regional Planning Commissions (RPCs) in a program administered by the Bay-Lake RPC to help communities, counties, and tribes plant trees to mitigate Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) impacts and reduce runoff.

The Bay-Lake RPC has recently announced the availability of new funding under the 2018 Wisconsin RPCs and WDNR Tree Planting Grant Program. The funding is available to all Wisconsin jurisdictions within the Great Lakes Basin. In Southeastern Wisconsin, all, or part, of Kenosha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Racine, Washington, and Waukesha Counties is located within the Great Lakes Basin. Just over \$120,000 will be available each year in 2018 and 2019 to fund projects ranging in cost from \$1,000 to \$20,000. All communities within the Wisconsin Great Lakes Basin are eligible, but this program will particularly be targeting projects in communities in the Basin that meet one or more of the following criteria:

- Within an EAB-quarantined county (all six of the Southeastern Wisconsin counties in the Basin are EAB-quarantined, see tinyurl.com/EAB-Quarantine),
- Within a watershed with surface water quality concerns (in Southeastern Wisconsin, certain communities in Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Washington, and Waukesha Counties are in targeted watersheds).
- On tribal lands,
- Within communities that are members of a regional planning commission,
- Within areas of concern (AOCs) for beneficial use impairments, and
- Within a Tree City USA community.

The funding is made available through two FY2018 U.S. Forest Service Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) grants received by the Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission.

In 2017, DPW removed approximately 350 EAB-infested ash trees and planted approximately 200 curbside trees. Because of the EAB infestation, the goal is to annually replace approximately 300 trees. As noted in the 2018 budget, Franklin has seen an increase in the spread of EAB and 2018 includes a budget increase from 2017 of \$2,000 to accommodate grindings. It should be noted that the Mayor's budget recommended \$32,000 for planting approximately 200 replacement trees and only \$5,000 was approved. \$5,000 represents approximately 30 trees.

#### **ANALYSIS**

The City of Franklin qualifies for four of the six requirements for this competitive grant because: Milwaukee County is an EAB-quarantined county; Franklin is located within a watershed with surface water quality concerns; Franklin is a member of a regional planning commission- SEWRPC; and Franklin has been a Tree City USA Community since 2000.

Eligible costs are those costs directly related to the completion of a tree planting project and that were incurred

during the project period. Example costs include the cost of purchased services, supplies, equipment use, product, or facilities used on the project (such as trees or staking materials). Trees must be 1 to 2.5 inches in diameter. The funding will not cover the planting of ash, maples, Callery pear (Pyrus calleryana), or Scotch pine.

An eligible 25% match includes options for cash or in-kind services provided for the project and that have occurred during the project period. In-kind costs can include employee salaries or fringe benefits for time needed for completing the project and incurred during the project period. Fringe benefit rates are capped at 48.07%. In-kind costs can include volunteer time at \$15/hour. Eligible match activities include costs associated with ash tree removals, purchased/contracted services, equipment use, supplies, or facilities used on the project (such as trees or pesticides).

Enclosed is a DRAFT version of Franklin's application. Staff is requesting \$7,500 that would be used for planting approximately 45 trees that will replace EAB-infected trees. Applications are due on April 9, 2018.

Although there are sufficient matching funds to ask for more, it is anticipated that there will be a lot of competition for the \$120,000. The City has previously applied for this grant and was unsuccessful. It was noted that most of the award winners were requesting smaller amounts.

Note that in-kind matches of labor, materials, and equipment to plant new trees or remove EAB trees are allowed. DPW could track at least \$2,500 of in-kind matches as part of the 25% match that would allow a total purchase of \$7,500 of trees that equates to approximately 45 trees. However, to be competitive, Staff recommends that \$2,500 cash (that is budgeted already for purchase of trees) be pledged with \$2,500 of in-kind services so that Franklin's grant application would only ask for \$7,500 (60%) of a \$12,500 project that results in approximately 60 trees- i.e. the grant would pay only 40% of a project instead of 75% that most communities will request.

This grant award is anticipated to be announced in May 2018.

Note that the attached resolution uses the recommended language from the grant website.

Staff is also anticipating other tree-related grants this year that will be investigated for applicability.

#### **FISCAL NOTE**

The \$2,500 match is in the 2018 budget for Highway Capital Outlay. The \$2,500 in-kind services are within other approved operating budgets.

Also available for funds are DPW donation funds that were never spent (\$2,500 from 2014 and \$8,397 from 2010). Staff is in the process of investigating the source of those funds and will attempt to leverage these funds as appropriate.

#### Part II: Project Overview

1. Briefly describe the project, the schedule, the species to be planted, caliper size, type of rootstock (e.g. seedlings, saplings, bare root, potted, or B&B), and impact to community:

This project will be the Fall replacement of ash trees lost due to Emerald Ash Borer. The city lost over 100 ash trees this year and hopes to replace these trees this fall 2018. The trees lost are city boulevard trees and are located within 6 to 10 feet of the roadway. The trees lost provided great benefits to storm water retention, home value, and aesthetics. Replacing these trees will occur in October/November of 2018. We would like to plant swamp white oak, hackberry, linden, American elms, and buckeye trees. The tree size would be in the 1 3/4in to 2 1/2in caliber size. Fall is a hard time to get these species due to the species digging schedule. The root stock would need to be primarily container grown for oaks, and buckeye. The hackberry, lindens and elms would be B&B. The city of Franklin since 2009 has lost almost 1/3 of the street tree population due to EAB. We have been diligently working to replace as many trees as possible while increasing our species diversity. We are no longer able to remove and replace trees in the same year. This grant would allow us to keep up with our replacements so that roadways are replanted in a timely matter. This would greatly help with storm water retention and the aesthetic value of a tree lined street. If not for the grant these roads will be bare for at least another whole year.

Under the direction of the Fire Chief and Assistant Fire Chief Adam Remington and Patrick Hays, a computing platform change has been requested for the Franklin Fire Department, one that would slowly eliminate the usage of Panasonic Toughbooks and move over to an Apple iPad mobility platform. The request is being made based upon the successful implementation of iPads in many of the Milwaukee Country municipalities. Today the usage of touch-enabled tablets for electronic patient care records (ePCR) has become commonplace. The plan on migrating over to a complete mobility-enabled computing platform will be done within two distinct phases. The timing requirement is largely being driven by Phoenix not having a fully stable CAD/WDA client that will function on a tablet.

Phase 1 will consist of moving the following core applications over to an Apple iPad tablet platform: ImageTrend ePCR, Pulsara hospital notification system, and Drug Integration database. ImageTrend ePCR has been specifically written for a tablet and touch-screen interface, which can function in both online (connected to the Internet) and offline mode. Pulsara is an application that is being mandated by Milwaukee County for 2018 in which all vehicle alerts and notifications will be sent to hospitals using a mobile app instead of traditional radio dispatching. Milwaukee County intends to remove several radio dispatch positions within 2018, and is requiring all municipalities to implement a mobile app-based solution for hospital notifications. The Drug Interaction database is a web-based application that can function either on a tablet or traditional Windows-based platform.

As part of Phase 1, all purchased iPads will contain a cellular modem card which will require an additional account to be set up with Verizon for each iPad. The cellular card will allow for secure connectivity to the Internet without the need for either mobile hotspots or wireless networks. Several municipalities strongly recommend this approach, as they have had problems in the past with hacking attempts when using mobile wireless networks or hotspots. At the February 28th Technology Commission meeting, the Commission members reviewed this approach and concurred that use of individual cellular connections was the most secure method of connectivity and would allow the greatest flexibility and range in establishing Internet connections from field locations. The Director of Information Technology sponsors the approach of using individual cellular connections over shared wireless.

Once Phoenix has stabilized and recommends their mobile CAD/WDA software for production deployment, Phase 2 will consist of moving GPS and CAD functionality from the current Panasonic Toughbook platform over to iPads. Additional iPads will be purchased during this future deployment, where permanent mounted tablets will be placed in each vehicle for GPS/CAD recording. Field tablets from Phase 1 will be used for ePCR data entry of patient diagnostic information. During Phase 2, all current Panasonic Toughbooks will be retired.

For the Fire Department's 2018 Capital Outlay Computer Equipment budget, \$6,750 was adopted to purchase new Toughbooks in order to replace aging equipment in several vehicles. With the planned migration from ruggedized laptops to iPads, a redesignation of these funds is requested that will allow for the purchasing of 8 to 10 iPads at an estimated purchase cost of \$349-\$420 per unit. Ruggedized tablet cases (a.k.a. "Otterboxes"), keyboards, and holding straps will also be purchased under the previously allocated funds. During Phase 1, existing Panasonic Toughbooks will continue to be used, but only for CAD/WDS functionality. Because the units will be kept within the vehicles, using tablets for field data entry, in the event that a Toughbook is no longer functional it can be replaced with a traditional/non-ruggedized laptop.

The Fire Department will have to absorb the cost of the air cards for the ipads. Ultimately, it is expected that the added cost increase should go away once Phoenix is updated and the Toughbooks, with their own air card, can be eliminated.

At the February 28, 2018 Technology Commission meeting, the Commission unanimously approved the platform change of migrating away from Panasonic Toughbooks to iPads, contingent that a success proof-of-concept be completed prior to deploying any new equipment. IT will need to purchase mobility management software as a separate budget item to allow for configuration, feature lock-down, and automatic application deployment. The IT Department has annual funding for emergency software purchases that can be used to cover the purchase of the mobility management software, which shouldn't exceed \$2,000. The IT Director will take recommendations to the Technology Commission on the solution/vendor to pursue. Note that it is possible that a cloud based service, such as VMWare Airwatch/Workspace One, may ultimately be recommended by the Technology Commission. In such an event, the limited cost of \$3.50 to \$5 per month per device are not dramatic and would be absorbed by the IT or Fire Departments for 2018. Also note that, unless otherwise directed by the Common Council and given the low cost involved, the approval requested herein is predicated on implementing a mobility management solution, so if the following motion is approved, the Director of Administration will move forward with selecting and implementing the mobility software after the Technology Commission's review without subsequent re-approval by the Common Council.

### COUNCIL ACTION REQUESTED

Motion to approve the computing platform change for the Franklin Fire Department, migrating away from Panasonic Toughbooks and moving over to an Apple iPad mobility platform, as approved/recommended by the Technology Commission, with the contingency that a successful proof-of-concept study be completed prior to deployment of any new equipment, and to further authorize the redesignation of the Fire Department's 2018 Capital Outlay Computer Equipment funds of \$6,750 to go towards the purchase of 8 to 10 iPads and accessories (cases, keyboards, holding straps).
