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

#### **Municipal Elected Office:**

At the April 2, 2024, Spring Election, the office for Municipal Judge (4-year term) will be on the ballot. The annual salary for the Office of Municipal Judge is \$21,000. Nomination papers for this office are now available for circulation and must be filed (along with other required documents) in the office of the City Clerk no later than 5 p.m. on January 2, 2024. #### 2024 Park Reservations

2024 Park Permit applications for Franklin groups or residents for reserving any of the pavilions/ areas listed below, will be accepted at City Hall,



**9229 W. Loomis Road, beginning Wednesday, January 3, 2024.** Applications must be made in person and permits will be issued on a first-come, first-serve basis. The front entrance of City Hall will open at 8:30 a.m. at which time numbers will be handed out. Once you receive a number, you must remain in the City Hall lobby until the Clerk's Office staff calls your number. Park permit applications will be accepted and processed in the order of numbers distributed. No telephone or mail-in applications are accepted. Non-Franklin groups may apply after April 1st.

- Lions Pavilion, 8050 S. Legend Drive, has available an open-air pavilion, electricity, picnic tables, water, and grills.
- Vernon E. Barg Pavilion, 8717 W. Drexel Avenue, has available an open-air pavilion, indoor serving area, electricity, picnic tables, water, and grills.
- Ken Windl Pavilion, 11615 W. Rawson Avenue, has an indoor air-conditioned/heated gathering space (maximum of 50 people), tables/chairs, kitchenette, picnic tables, electricity, and water.
- Franklin Woods Pavilion, 3723 W. Puetz Road, has available an open-air pavilion, electricity, picnic tables within the pavilion, and water. There are no grills available. A gas grill may be brought, however, no charcoal grills allowed. Note: Kayla's Playground is not reservable—the playground and patio area must be shared with the general public.
- Pleasant View Pavilion, 4620 W. Evergreen Street, has available an open-air pavilion, indoor serving area, electricity, picnic tables, and water. Maximum of 50 people.
- Market Square, 11230 W. Franklin Street, has available a gazebo, picnic tables, and electricity. There are no restrooms or water available at Market Square.
- Playground equipment, tennis courts, and volleyball courts, where available at all of the above listed parks, must be shared with the general public.

Rental hours for all park pavilions are 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Lions Pavilion, Vernon E. Barg Pavilion, Franklin Woods Pavilion, and Market Square are available from April 15—October 31. Ken Windl and Pleasant View Park pavilions are available year-round.

#### **Snow & Ice Control**

Residents with concerns regarding winter street maintenance may call the Public Works Department at 414-425-2592. Regular hours are Monday—Friday, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., or whenever weather conditions warrant winter street maintenance. If no one is available to take your call, please leave a message and someone will get back to you. If immediate attention is required, please call the Police Department at 414-425-2522.

#### **Tips & Street/Sidewalk Winter Maintenance**


- To maintain safety on City streets and sidewalks, the City of Franklin, through its Municipal Code, prohibits any person from throwing, blowing, placing, or piling any snow or ice on any public street, public place, or public property. This also pertains to depositing plowed snow in roadside ditches and public road right-of-way of yours or neighboring properties. Artificial snow accumulations can create a traffic or pedestrian hazard. Violators may be ticketed.
- Please place garbage and recycling containers 2 feet back from the street during a snowfall. This will help prevent the rolling snow from snowplows from covering or tipping them. Garbage cans should never be placed in the street.
- The owner, occupant, or person in charge of any building or lot fronting or adjoining any street is responsible for clearing the sidewalk abutting such building or lot of snow and ice. After snow or ice has formed on any sidewalk, the sidewalk must be cleared within 24 hours. When ice has formed on any sidewalk that cannot be removed, the walk must be kept safe by applying an abrasive material or salt within 24 hours. If any sidewalk is neglected, the Department of Public Works shall have the snow and/or ice removed and will charge the responsible party.
- Mailbox Replacement Policy: The City will repair any mailbox that
  has been determined to have been struck by a City snowplow or
  replace it with a standard mailbox; however, damage to
  mailboxes caused by snow coming off City snowplows will NOT
  be repaired. Mailboxes and posts are expected to be in good
  condition and strong enough to withstand the force of snow
  coming off the City snowplows.
- Winter Parking Regulations: City Municipal Code states that from December 1 to April 1 there is no parking allowed on any City street between 2 a.m. and 7 a.m., Mondays through Saturdays, and between 3 a.m. and 7 a.m. on Sundays, except physicians on emergency calls. Permission to park contrary to these provisions may be granted by the Police Department upon request for the reason of the emergency and unforeseen conditions, provided that such parking will not interfere with snow removal operations. If a snow emergency is declared, then no parking is allowed on any City street between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.
- <u>Sump Pump Discharge:</u> City Code prohibits the discharge of water from sump pumps upon any public street or highway from November 15 to April 15, as this leads to ice build-up on streets. During this period, property owners shall discharge water from their sumps onto their lawn at a point not more than 10 feet from their building.

## The Adopted 2024 Budget and the 2023 Property Tax Bills

Property tax bills are scheduled to be mailed during the week of December 11, 2023. Approximate Breakdown of Tax Dollars by These property tax bills reflect the total property taxes collected from all applicable taxing jurisdictions, including the City of Franklin, the local school district, MATC, MMSD, and Milwaukee County. Under the law, the City is required to collect property taxes from 7 different taxing authorities. As the pie chart illustrates to the right, the City of Franklin is directly responsible for approximately one-quarter of the total property tax charges.

The City of Franklin portion of this year's tax bill funds local municipal services provided by the City in 2024. That bill includes a 1.1 percent overall average resident City tax increase. The growth in the tax levy from the prior year is \$521,100, and the percent of the levy attributed to new development in the City in 2023 is approximately 1.76 percent. The increase for all property values in 2023 is about 13.01 percent; however, residential properties increased by roughly 11.37 percent, increasing the portion of the levy funded by residential property taxes. The change in individual tax bills is based on the assessed value multiplied by the established tax rate. The approved budget continues to focus on maintaining City services, protecting City assets, and using resources responsibly to serve the City of Franklin prudently.

## **Each Taxing Jurisdiction**



The City of Franklin general operations represents one quarter of the total property tax bill.

New development and changes in individual property values offset the increased levy such that the City's municipal tax rate will decrease from approximately \$4.38 to \$4.05 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The taxing decisions of the other taxing jurisdictions and variations in assessment impacts between property types and locations will ultimately determine how an individual property's tax bill will change. Overall, including the State School Levy Credit, which the State uses to reduce the effective school districts' property tax levy, the approximate combined property tax rates will decrease from \$17.62 to \$16.18 in the Franklin School District, from \$17.40 to \$16.26 in the Oak Creek/ Franklin School District, and from \$17.52 to \$15.46 in the Whitnall School District. #### How are my taxes calculated?

The approved tax levies from all taxing jurisdictions are divided by the assessed valuation, as certified by the Board of Review, to determine the tax rates. Franklin has three school districts; therefore, three different tax rates may apply to a citizen's tax bill. If you compare your tax bill to another property's, please ensure the tax bills have the same taxing authorities to complete a true cost comparison.

#### Where can I find the 2023 tax rates?

Tax rates are shown on the insert included in your 2023 Property Tax Bill. This insert shows the tax rates for all properties by school district and a breakdown by taxing entity.

#### What are the credits on my tax bill?

The State provides a Lottery and Gaming Credit for qualifying property owners for their primary residence only. If the credit was on your 2022 tax bill or you filed the 2023 Lottery Credit form, the credit will be on your 2023 tax bill. If the credit is not on your tax bill and you are eligible, it can be deducted from your 2023 tax bill until January 31, 2024. A First Dollar Credit is provided for all taxable property with improvements, based on the equalized value of the school tax rate. Amounts vary by school district for both credits.

#### What are the additional charges on my tax bill?

Tax bills may contain other charges such as the solid waste fee, annual payments of outstanding special assessments, delinquent sewer and water bills as of November 15, and other unpaid bills outstanding at that time. All additional charges are due by January 31, 2024, and do not qualify for installment payments.

#### What if I do not receive my tax bill?

Tax bills are sent to the property owner of record. For properties recently purchased in August-November, the City may not have received the transfer details from Milwaukee County. Those tax bills will be sent to the seller. You may print a bill at www.franklinwi.gov, request the bill from the seller, or contact the Treasury Office at 414-425-4770 to obtain the property tax information.

### **Property Tax Bill Payments**

Property tax bills are scheduled to be mailed during the week of December 11, 2023. Payment is due January 31, 2024, and may be paid in the following ways:

- Online: Pay via the "Property Taxes/Tax Web Portal" link under the "Quick Links" on the home page of the City's website at www.franklinwi.gov. To pay your taxes online, please refer to the instructions included in your tax bill. There is a nominal fee for paying your taxes online, and payment options will be via a credit/ debit card, personal Visa debit, or electronic check from your bank. Processing online payments takes one business day, so plan accordingly related to due dates.
- Mail: Payment is deposited the day received. Please include the payment coupon. Confirmation of your payment is available in the Property Tax Web Portal on the City's website after payment is receipted-see www.franklinwi.gov, click the "Property Taxes" icon and then "Property Tax Web Portal/Pay Your Taxes Online".
- **Delivery to Drop Box:** A drop box is located right outside of the main entrance to City Hall and is available 24/7. This is a good alternative to standing in line to pay your taxes or submitting payment when the Treasury Office is closed. Please include the payment coupon attached to your tax bill with the payment.
- In-person payments may be made at City Hall, 9229 W. Loomis Road. Wait times vary, with the longest wait times occurring near December 31. Your payment coupon will facilitate the payment process and a receipt will be provided. Checks and money orders are encouraged for safety and speed of processing.

Daily payment hours are Monday-Friday 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. For tax payment purposes, payment hours will be extended on the following dates: Monday-Friday, Dec. 11-15, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Monday-Friday, Dec. 18-22, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Wednesday-Friday, Dec. 27-29, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Treasury Office will be CLOSED December 23-26 and December 30-January 2.

## **Annual Pet Licensing**

Pet licenses are required to be obtained annually by Franklin residents who own a dog, cat, or tiny horse that is at least 5 months of age on January 1st, or 5 months of age within the license year. License applications are due by April 1st of each year, or within 30 days from the adoption of your new pet. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate issued by your veterinarian is required as proof of vaccination.

The cost of a pet license is as follows:

Altered Pet-\$12 / Unaltered Pet-\$24

Late Fee for Altered Pet-\$6 / Late Fee for Unaltered Pet-\$12

The City prefers that you pay for your pet license directly through the City of Franklin either in person at the Treasurer's Office at City Hall, by mail, or by use of the drop box outside of City Hall at 9229 W. Loomis Road, Franklin, WI 53132. Please be sure to include your pet license application (visit www.franklinwi.gov, click on "I Want To..." and then "License a Pet"), vaccination records, and a check made payable to the City of Franklin.

The Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission (MADACC) has overall responsibility for issuing pet licenses in Milwaukee County. As such, pet licenses may also be applied for online by visiting the MADACC website at www.madacc.org. Payments made via MADACC's website can be made by check or by credit card.

## **Christmas Tree Safety**

As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly.

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#### **PICKING THE TREE**

 Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.

#### **PLACING THE TREE**

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least 3' away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.

#### LIGHTING THE TREE

- Use lights that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
   Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

**GET RID OF THE TREE** after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home.

## Milwaukee County Home Repair

The Milwaukee County Housing Division offers no-interest loans to income-qualified homeowners in the suburban communities of Milwaukee County, *excluding* the Village of River Hills and the Cities of Milwaukee and West Allis, through its Home Repair Program. Loans or grants are available through the program.

Owner-occupied homes are eligible if the homeowner meets income guidelines and property requirements (see income guidelines in the chart below). These funds can be used to make emergency repairs, correct code violations, or improve the living quality of your home. Common items repaired include hot water heaters, furnaces, sewer laterals, roofs, siding, trim, windows, porches, foundations, plumbing, and electrical. Projects funded by Home Repair loans will be secured by a lien on the home.

Program staff will help you through the application process, work with you to create a scope of work, and screen contractors to make sure they are right for your project. Once a contractor is selected, program staff put together an agreement with the contractor and oversee the project while in progress. Upon completion, the County pays the contractor directly. The homeowner repays the County according to the terms of the loan.

The City of Franklin has been awarded grant funds specific to residents of Franklin. For residents who qualify, a portion of the project cost could be covered by the City's grant funds. Grant amounts may be up to half the project cost, generally targeted for up to \$5,000, and do not have to be paid back. #### **BRUSH AND LEAF PICK-UPS**

There will be brush and leaf pickups beginning May 6, September 9, October 28, and November 11. Brush and leaves must be curbside and next to the driveway at 7 a.m. on these designated Mondays. Leaves must be in paper compostable yard waste bags or 32-gallon or smaller containers that can be emptied into the collection truck. PLASTIC BAGS OF ANY KIND ARE NOT ALLOWED AND WILL NOT BE PICKED UP, which includes no "compostable green" or biodegradable plastic bags. Brush is limited to ONE pile no larger than 4' x 4' x 5' per household with branches less than 6" in diameter and a pile weight less than 50 lbs. Brush must be piled or bundled (bundled piles are preferred).

#### **CHRISTMAS TREE PICK-UP**

Christmas tree pickup by the Franklin Department of Public Works for the next 2 years will be **7 a.m. on January 8, 2024 and January 13, 2025.** Trees should be placed at the end of the driveway no more than 24 hours before the scheduled pickup and should be free of decorations, lights, and tree stands. Trees should not be covered with snow or be placed in a bag. (Wreaths are to be disposed of with the regular garbage.)

#### SHARPS (NEEDLES, SYRINGES, LANCETS)

Wisconsin Law requires that sharps be properly discarded. The City of Franklin Health Department is a sharps collection site for residents only. Biohazard containers may be purchased from the Health Department. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Call 414-425-9101 for further information. Sharps may not be placed in household trash.

<u>SPECIAL PICK-UP</u> - To dispose of large amounts of carpet, large furniture, electronics, and refuse not considered "regular household garbage", <u>call Johns Disposal Service at 1-888-473-4701 or 262-473-4700 to arrange a special pickup and for pricing</u> (prepay by credit card only).

#### **AUTOMATED GARBAGE AND RECYCLING PICK-UP**



Garbage (brown cart) and recycling (green cart) are picked up <u>weekly</u>, both on your scheduled garbage collection day. <u>Cart Placement:</u> The arrows on the lid of the carts must point to the street. Handles and wheels should face away from the street. The garbage cart should be placed within 2 feet of the street on one side of the driveway and the recycle cart should be placed within 2 feet of the street on the other side of the driveway. Please keep 6 feet of clearance between the carts and other objects, especially

mailboxes and vehicles. Carts should not be placed in the street.

Items to be placed in Green Recycling Cart:

aluminum cans, clean aluminum foil, tin/steel/aerosol cans, empty/dried paint cans, glass bottles/jars, #1-7 plastic, milk/soup/juice cartons, newspaper, magazines, books, mail, school/office paper, brown corrugated cardboard, cereal/shoe boxes, paper bags, shredded paper secured in a clear plastic bag. No other recycling should be placed in bags.

Items NOT to be placed in Green Cart:

styrofoam, yard waste, trash, household hazardous waste, construction materials, electronics, clothing

<u>Items to be placed in Brown Garbage Cart:</u>

plastic wrap, plastic bags, broken toys, ceramics, light bulbs, bagged garbage, food waste, styrofoam, other loose trash—please put bagged trash in the brown cart. Bags that are tied keep the carts clean.

Items NOT to be placed in Brown Cart:

yard waste, recyclables, household hazardous waste, cardboard boxes, construction materials, electronics, medical waste/sharps



## **FPS Financial Update**

**ANDY CHROMY,** Assistant Superintendent of Business & Operations

In 2022-2023, the district levied an additional \$3.8 million and used these funds, along with another \$1.2 million, to prepay debt. This prepaying debt saved us over \$2.4 million in interest payments over the life of the loan. In addition, it allowed the district to remove the final year of payment on the debt related to the Saber Center addition at FHS. For 2023-24, the district is again proposing additional levy to apply to debt prepayments for the purpose of saving long term interest payments.

The FPS School Board has been actively engaged in learning sessions about *Franklin Forward* during School Board meetings since August 2023 and continuing through the Summer of 2024. District leadership, led by FPS District Administrator Annalee Bennin, and our community partners have been sharing with the Board about the conditions of our schools and planned growth potential



for our school district. In early September, the FPS School Board actively engaged in touring our facilities to see first hand the type of work this may entail.
