

The Adopted 2026 Budget and 2025 Property Tax Bills

Property tax bills will be mailed by the statutory deadline of the third Monday in December (available online sooner). These bills reflect property taxes from all applicable jurisdictions, including the City of Franklin, local school districts, MATC, MMSD, and Milwaukee County. The City is responsible for collecting taxes on behalf of 7 taxing authorities. The accompanying pie chart shows that Franklin directly accounts for about one-quarter of the total tax bill. Please note: The figures presented here are based on assessed values.

City of Franklin's Tax Impact

The City's portion of the tax bill funds local municipal services in 2026. This year, the average preliminary increase for residential City taxes is approximately 2.9%.



 New Development Contribution: Approximately 2.27% of the levy increase is attributed to new development in 2025.

Property Value Changes: Overall, preliminary assessed property values increased by 1.14%, with residential properties rising about 0.6%. 2025 property values remained relatively stagnant due to 2025 being a maintenance year.

Individual tax bills depend on a property's assessed value multiplied by the tax rate. The approved budget prioritizes maintaining City services, protecting assets, and using resources responsibly.



 3-year term for 3rd, 4th, & 6th District Alderperson Annual Salary: \$7,200 plus \$4,200 for mileage and technology-related expenses.

Nomination papers are available for circulation and must be filed (along with other required documents) in the office of the City Clerk no later than 5 pm on January 6, 2026. If interested in obtaining the documents required for these offices, or need additional information, please contact the City Clerk's Office at 414-425-7500.

Annual Pet Licensing

Residents who own a dog, cat, or tiny horse that is at least 5 months old on January 1st or 5 months old during the



January 1st or 5 months old during the license year must obtain an annual pet license. License applications are due by April 1st, or within 30 days from the adoption of your new pet. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate issued by your veterinarian is required as proof of vaccination. The cost of a pet license is as follows:

Altered Pet: \$12 / Unaltered Pet: \$24
Late Fee Altered Pet: \$6 / Late Fee Unaltered Pet: \$12

Payment Options: In person at the Treasurer's Office, placing in the drop box outside of City Hall, or mailing to 9229 W. Loomis Road. Include your pet license application (visit franklinwi.gov, click on "I Want To..." and "License a Pet"), vaccination records, and check made payable to the City of Franklin.

[The Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission (MADACC) has overall responsibility for issuing pet licenses in Milwaukee County. As such, pet licenses may also be applied for online at madacc.org.]

2026 Park Reservations



Vernon Barg Park Pavilion

2026 park permit applications for Franklin groups/residents will be accepted at City Hall, 9229 W. Loomis Road, starting January 2, 2026. Applications must be submitted in person, and permits will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis.

Numbers will be distributed starting at 8 am on January 2. Once you receive a number, you must remain in the City Hall lobby until your number is called. Applications will be received and handled in the order of numbers distributed. Telephone and mail-in applications are not accepted. Non-Franklin groups may apply after April 1st.

- Lions Pavilion, 8050 S. Legend Drive: open-air pavilion, electric, picnic tables, water, grills.
- Vernon Barg Pavilion, 8717 W. Drexel Avenue: open-air pavilion, indoor serving area, electric, picnic tables, water, grills.
- Ken Windl Pavilion, unavailable until needed repairs are completed, 11615 W. Rawson Avenue: indoor airconditioned/heated gathering space (50 people max), tables/chairs, kitchenette, picnic tables, electric, water.
- Franklin Woods Pavilion, 3723 W. Puetz Road: open-air pavilion, electric, picnic tables, water. A gas grill may be brought; however, no charcoal grills are allowed. Note: Kayla's Playground is not reservable—the playground and patio area must be shared with the general public.
- Pleasant View Pavilion, 4620 W. Evergreen Street: open-air pavilion, indoor serving area, electric, picnic tables, water. Maximum of 50 people.
- Market Square, 11230 W. Franklin Street: gazebo, picnic tables, electric (no restrooms or water available).
- Playground equipment, tennis courts, and volleyball courts, where available at all of the above-listed parks, must be shared with the general public.

Pavilion rental hours are 11 am to 8 pm. Lions pavilion, Vernon Barg pavilion, Franklin Woods pavilion, and Market Square are available April 15—October 31. Ken Windl (once available after repairs are completed) and Pleasant View Park pavilions are available year-round.

Reminder: Signs Prohibited in Public Right-of-Way

Signs in the public right-of-way are prohibited. Private signs, such as "For Sale" or "Rummage", political signs, event signs, and other non-regulatory signs must be placed on private property.

Why? Signs can distract drivers, obstruct views at intersections, and create obstacles for maintenance and utility crews.

What constitutes the right-of-way? The public right-of-way is generally the area beside the road which includes fixtures such as sidewalks, curbs, utility poles, and regulatory/traffic signs. This area can differ in width throughout the City; please refer to the GIS map on the City's website (www.Franklinwi.gov), or contact the Public Works Department at 414-425-2592 with questions.

What happens to signs placed in the right-of-way? These signs will be removed and disposed of by City staff.

Tax Rate Adjustments

The total value of property in Franklin has not changed significantly; however, the levy limit has been increased due to an increase in net new construction from the previous year, which results in a *preliminary* increase in the City's municipal tax rate:

- 2024: Approximately \$3.83 per \$1,000 of assessed value.
- **2025**: *Preliminary* \$3.92 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Taxing decisions by other jurisdictions and variations in property assessments will influence individual tax bills. Factoring in the State School Levy Credit, the *preliminary* rates are:

- Franklin School District: Combined tax rate increases from \$16.23 to \$16.73.
- Oak Creek/Franklin School District: Combined tax rate increases from \$14.63 to \$15.71.
- Whitnall School District: Combined tax rate increases from \$14.65 to \$16.18.

Property Tax Bill FAQs (For additional questions, please call 414-425-4770)

How are my taxes calculated? Tax rates are determined by dividing the approved levies of all taxing jurisdictions by the total assessed valuation, as certified by the Board of Review. Franklin has three school districts, so tax rates vary depending on the district. Ensure that properties being compared fall under the same taxing authorities.

Where can I find the 2025 tax rates? Tax rates are included with your tax bill, with a breakdown by school district and taxing entity. Also, you may find the tax rates on the City website.

What are the credits on my tax bill?

- Lottery/Gaming Credit: For qualifying primary residences. If you received the credit in 2024 or filed the 2025 form, the credit will appear automatically. Eligible homeowners without the credit can apply and deduct it until 1/31/2026.
- First Dollar Credit: Provided for taxable property with improvements based on the school district's equalized value. This is an automatic process with no application needed.

What if I do not receive my tax bill? Recently purchased properties (August-November) may still be listed under the seller's name. Tax information can be obtained from the City's website (www.franklinwi.gov), the seller, or the Treasury Office at 414-425-4770. If you do not receive a tax bill by December 22, please call the above number and the Treasury Office will provide a copy to you via email.

My escrow check exceeds my tax bill—what happens? The Finance Department processes overpayments within 10 to 14 business days. Refunds under \$8 are only issued upon request and are subject to an \$8 fee.

Property Tax Bill Payments

Due Date: Payments are due by January 31, 2026. Wisconsin law prohibits waiving late fees. No late fee will be waived by the City.

Payment Methods:

- Online: Pay via the "Property Taxes" link at www.franklinwi.gov. Payment fees: 2.55% for credit, \$3.95 for Visa debit, or \$1.50 for echeck.
- Mail: <u>Please include the payment coupon.</u> Payments are posted the day they are received. Confirmation is available online.
- **Drop Box:** A 24/7 drop box is located outside City Hall. <u>Please include your payment coupon</u> for faster processing.
- In Person: Payments can be made at City Hall (9229 W. Loomis Road). Avoid peak hours near December 31.
- Bank Auto-Pay: If using a bank's auto-pay service, ensure checks are postmarked or delivered on time to avoid penalties. Wisconsin law prohibits waiving late fees. No late fee will be waived by the City.

Extended Hours: For tax payment purposes, payment hours will be extended to 8 am to 5 pm on the following dates:

- December 8-12 / December 15-19 / December 22 & 23 / December 26 / December 29 & 30.
- The Treasury Office will be closed on December 24, 25, 31, and January 1.

Snow & Ice Control

Winter street maintenance concerns may be directed to the Department of Public Works (DPW) at 414-425-2592, M—F, 7 am to 3 pm, or whenever weather conditions warrant street maintenance. If immediate attention is needed, please call the Police Department at 414-425-2522.

- The City prohibits the throwing, blowing, placing, or piling of snow or ice on any public street, place, or property. This also pertains to placing plowed snow in roadside ditches and public road right-of-way of yours or neighboring properties. Violators may be ticketed.
- Place garbage and recycling containers 2 feet back from the street during a snowfall to prevent them from being covered or tipped by snowplows. Garbage cans should never be placed in the street.
- The owner of a building or lot fronting or adjoining any street is responsible for clearing the sidewalk abutting that building or lot of snow and ice within 24 hours. When ice has formed, an abrasive material or salt needs to be applied within 24 hours. If neglected, the DPW will clear the sidewalk and charge the responsible party.
- Mailbox Replacement Policy: The City will repair any mailbox determined to have been struck by a City snowplow or replace it with a standard mailbox; however, mailboxes damaged by snow coming off City snowplows will NOT be repaired. Mailboxes and posts are expected to be in good condition and strong enough to withstand the force of snow coming off the snowplows.
- Winter Parking Regulations: From December 1 to April 1 there is no parking allowed on City streets between 2 am and 7 am, Mondays through Saturdays, and between 3 am and 7 am on Sundays, except physicians on emergency calls. Permission to park contrary to these provisions may be granted by the Police Department. If a snow emergency is declared, then no parking is allowed on any City street between 11 pm and 6 am.
- Sump Pump Discharge: City code prohibits the discharge of water from sump pumps on any public street or highway from November 15 to April 15. During this time, sump pump water should be discharged onto lawns at a point not more than 10 feet from a building.

The Milwaukee County Housing Division offers no-interest loans to income-qualified homeowners in the suburban communities of Milwaukee County, excluding the Village of HOME REPAIR River Hills and the Cities of Milwaukee and West Allis, through its Home Repair Program. Loans or

windows, porches, foundations, plumbing, and electrical. Projects funded by Home Repair loans will be secured by a lien on the home.

Program staff help you through the application process, work with you to create a scope of work, and screen contractors to make sure they are right for your project. Once a contractor is selected, program staff put together an agreement with the contractor and oversee the project while in progress. Upon completion, the County pays the contractor directly. The homeowner repays the County according to the terms of the loan.

The City of Franklin has been awarded grant funds specific to residents of Franklin. For residents who qualify, a portion of the project cost could be covered by the City's grant funds. Grant amounts may be up to half of the project cost, generally targeted for up to \$5,000, and do not have to be paid back.

Radon Testing

About 1 out of 10 homes in Wisconsin has high radon levels. You can't see or smell radon, so testing is the only way to know if you are being

exposed to high levels. If high levels are detected, there are effective mitigation strategies to reduce exposure.

- The Franklin DPW will begin picking up at 7am on the listed dates. Please place trees at the end of driveway no more than 24 hours in advance. <u>Trees should be free of decorations, lights, and tree stands, and should not be covered in snow or placed in a bag.</u>
- Wreaths can be disposed of with the regular trash.

Sharps Disposal (Needles, Syringes, Lancets):

Residents may dispose of sharps or purchase biohazard containers through the Franklin Health Department, Ph. 414-425-9101, between the hours of 8 am and 4:30 pm, Monday-Friday.

Automated Trash & Recycling Pickup:

The trash cart (brown) and recycling cart (green) are picked up weekly on your scheduled collection day. **Cart Placement:** Please place carts on opposite sides of the bottom of your driveway by 7am on collection day. The arrows on the lid should point toward the street.

Carts should NOT be placed in the roadway.

<u>Items to be placed in green recycling cart:</u>

aluminum cans, clean aluminum foil, tin/steel/aerosol cans, empty/dried paint cans, glass bottles & jars, #1-#7 plastic, milk/soup/juice cartons, newspaper, magazines & books, paper, brown corrugated cardboard, boxes, paper bags, shredded paper in clear plastic bag (no other recycling should be placed in plastic bags)

Items NOT to be placed in recycle cart:

styrofoam, yard waste, trash, hazardous waste, electronics, clothing, construction material, propane tanks, helium tanks, fire extinguishers

Items to be placed in brown trash cart:

food & household waste, light bulbs, plastic bags, styrofoam, plastic wrap, broken toys, ceramics, regular batteries (non-rechargeable, non-button batteries), other loose trash

<u>Trash is to be placed in bags that are tied to keep</u> the carts clean.

Items NOT to be placed in trash cart:

yard waste, recyclables, household hazardous waste, electronics, cardboard boxes, construction materials, medical waste/sharps, propane tanks, helium tanks, fire extinguishers


