A Letter From Mayor Olson

Dear Neighbors:

Your staff, boards and commissions, Common Council, and I have been working very hard on your behalf. We are seeing a lot of the results of that effort.

Above you see the new City logo that has been adopted by the Common Council to replace the logo from 1988. This logo was approved from a group of logos recommended to the Tourism Commission and the Economic Development Commission who then in turn presented two to the Common Council for the final decision. This new logo is a very small piece of our initiative to rebrand and market the City. This effort has been underway for several years and is funded predominantly through the Tourism Commission whose budget comes from the Hotel-Motel Room

Tax and existing Economic Development budgets. A full-color version is viewable on our City website at www.franklinwi.gov.

Part of this re-branding effort was an unscientific but significant preference and attitude survey conducted over several months. The Commissions and the Common Council learned a lot from the study. One of the biggest issues was communications with you, the constituents, about what's going on in the City. We are committed to improving that "communication" starting now. Here are some of the things happening in the City:

Construction is starting on a new multi-use residential/commercial and industrial area on Loomis Road south of Ryan Road by Bear Development of Kenosha. About 79 new home sites will be developed along with commercial uses along Loomis Road, industrial uses on the south side of the development, and a large natural area in the center of the development.

- The Ball Park Commons development continues. By the time you read this, the Milwaukee Milkmen will have played their first game in the stadium and Wheel and Sprocket will be planning their grand opening. The senior living apartments are going up rapidly and very shortly ground will be broken on the Luxe Golf building, the two restaurants and beer garden, as well as the Sports Village, Midwest Orthopedics, and Exos Training facility. Soon there will be many more announcements for additional developments in this project. Full details including drawings, videos, plans, and financial documents are on the City website.
- The housing market in Franklin remains very strong. Existing homes are selling rapidly, and the two new subdivisions and one new condominium project are all experiencing sales far above their projections.
- Our new middle school is about to open this fall. The facility is wonderful.
- City Hall will be getting a minor facelift as part of a roofing maintenance/replacement project that also includes new heating and air conditioning. This expenditure will add at least another 20 years to the useful life of the building.
- The Franklin Fire Department continues to work with surrounding communities on cooperative efforts to maintain or improve the service to the area. We are working with the Wisconsin Policy Forum to study the options with Greenfield and Hales Corners. The goal is to provide as good or better service at the same or less cost. That goal is shared by the leadership from all three communities.
- The Franklin Police Department continues to provide excellent service to our community with adjustments to some of their programs. For more information on those program shifts that have been in effect since February, visit the Police Department page on the City website.
- Our Independence Day Celebration will be four days this year! The schedule of events is included in this newsletter.
 I hope you will bring the family for some food, parades, music, and TWO nights of fireworks in celebration of the birth of our nation and freedoms.

Milwaukee County Home Repair

The Milwaukee County Housing Division offers no-interest loans to income-qualified homeowners in the suburban communities of Milwaukee County, *excluding* the Village of River Hills and the Cities of Milwaukee and West Allis, through its Home Repair Program. Loans or grants are available through the program.

Owner-occupied homes are eligible if the homeowner(s) meet income guidelines and property requirements. These funds can be used to make emergency repairs, correct code violations, or improve the living quality of your home. Projects funded by Home Repair loans will be secured by a lien on the home.

Program Staff will help you through the application process, work with you to create a scope of work, and screen contractors to make sure they are right for your project. Once a contractor is selected, program staff put together an agreement with the contractor and oversee the project while in progress. Upon completion, the County pays the contractor directly. The homeowner repays the County according to the terms of the loan.

<u>The City of Franklin has been awarded grant funds specific to</u> <u>residents of Franklin.</u> For residents who qualify, a portion of the project cost could be covered by the City's grant funds. Grants may be up to <u>half</u> the project cost, no greater than \$5,000, and do not have to be paid back. Grilling Safety

There is nothing like outdoor grilling! The following safety tips will help you and your family enjoy a safe grilling season:

- Wear short sleeves or roll them up when cooking on the grill and use long-handled barbecue tools.
- Maintain a 3 foot safety zone, free of children and pets, around your grill. Grill well away from siding and deck rails and out from under eaves and overhanging branches. Do not grill underneath tarps/tents.
- Periodically remove fat and grease buildup from the grill racks and trays below grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.
- Grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors or enclosed spaces, such as tents, they pose a fire hazard and risk of exposure to toxic gases and potential asphyxiation. Grilling on decks and patios poses a fire hazard.

Gas Grills

- Check the gas cylinder hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. A light soap and water solution applied to the hose will quickly reveal escaping propane by releasing bubbles. If your grill has a leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off the gas tank and grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department.
- Gas grill lids should be open before lighting the grill.
- If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.
- Never store propane gas cylinders in buildings or garages. If you store
 a gas grill inside during the winter, disconnect the cylinder and leave it
 outside.
- Use only equipment bearing the mark of an independent testing laboratory. Follow the manufacturer's instructions on how to set up and maintain the grill.

Charcoal Grills

- If using fluid to start a charcoal grill, use only fluid intended for this purpose. It is extremely dangerous to substitute any other combustible liquid, especially gasoline, which can be ignited explosively by even a tiny spark.
- Apply starter fluid directly to the coals, then reseal and store the can out of reach of children and away from heat sources. Light the coals carefully, avoiding the flame flare-up.
- Cool coals completely before disposing in a metal container.

Franklin Rules for Apartment/Condo Outdoor Grill Use

- Check with your homeowner's association, property manager, or landlord as their rules and/or requirements may be stricter than that of Franklin's Fire Prevention Code.
- Use and/or storage of gas and charcoal grills of any size are prohibited on balconies. Electric grills (i.e., "George Foreman" type grills) are allowed to be used/stored on balconies, but they must be UL -listed and designed for outdoor use.
- Charcoal and gas grills may be stored on ground-level patios and decks but must be moved to a minimum of 10 feet from any building, overhang, or combustible surface when in use. Transporting compressed gas or propane through a residential living space is prohibited by law.
- Use extreme caution when using charcoal lighter fluid.

Sharps Collection

The Franklin Health Department is an approved collection site for medical needles, syringes, and sharps. Residents may bring in their medical sharps in approved red containers for free disposal. New sharps containers are available for a fee as well. **Collection times are Monday thru Friday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.**



Medication Collection

Franklin residents can dispose of unneeded or expired over-the-counter and prescription medication at the Franklin Police Department. These medications include ointments, sprays, inhalers, creams, and pet medication. Items that are not accepted are: needles/sharps, personal care products (shampoo, soap, lotion), and household hazardous waste (paint, oil, gas, etc.). Medications may be dropped off any day of the week. The Police Department lobby is open 24 hours a day.
