The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires drinking water utilities to provide an Annual Water Quality Report (otherwise known as a Consumer Confidence Report) to help consumers understand where their drinking water comes from so they can make informed decisions about their health and protection of the environment.



The City of Franklin's 2024 Annual Water Quality Report is provided inside this newsletter and explains the process and precautions taken to provide quality water to City consumers. The Franklin Water Utility is committed to providing its customers with the highest-quality drinking water that meets and exceeds standards more stringent than federal and state requirements.

Walking & Biking Safety



As summer approaches, the Franklin Health Department urges everyone to find time for outdoor physical activity! To promote safe walking and biking, **hi-visibility vests are available at the Franklin Health and Police Departments, courtesy of the Franklin Lions Clubs.**



Walk on a sidewalk if it exists. If no sidewalk exists, walk facing traffic on the left side of the road as far from traffic as possible. When riding a bike, always wear a fitted helmet and bright clothing, ride as close as practicable to the right side of the roadway or use bike lanes when possible, follow traffic rules, stay hydrated, and wear sunblock.

2025 Property Assessments & Board of Review

The Assessor's Office completed a city-wide revaluation in 2024. For 2025, we are in a **maintenance year**, meaning your property's assessed value will remain the same unless a change occurred—such as new construction, remodeling, demolition, or correction of records. If your property value has changed, you will receive a **Notice of Assessment** in the mail.

All 2025 property values and updated records will be available during **Open Book**, which gives property owners a chance to review their information and ask questions before values are finalized. If you still disagree with your value after Open Book, you may file a formal objection with the City Clerk and appear at the **Board of Review**—a quasi-judicial body that hears appeals and makes determinations based on testimony and evidence. **For Open Book and Board of Review dates, please monitor our web page at franklinwi.gov/Assessor.htm.**

▪ S. 76th Street (CTH U) Reconstruction

Schedule: In progress with completion in fall 2025.

▪ W. Ryan Road (STH 100) Resurfacing

Limits: S. 60th Street to W. Puetz Road

Road to be closed throughout the duration of the project.
Detour Route: Motorists are to use WIS 241 (S. 27th Street), County BB (W. Rawson Avenue), and WIS 36 (W. Loomis Road). Visit franklinwi.gov or the Wisconsin DOT website—projects.511wi.gov/100resurf—for updates.

▪ W. Drexel Avenue Reconstruction

Limits: S. 60th Street to S. Bridge View Drive (excluding S. 51st Street roundabout).

Schedule: Start early June and complete early fall 2025.
Road to be closed throughout the duration of the project. Local residential traffic will be allowed for residents living on W. Drexel Avenue only. **Detour routes** will be set prior to construction starting, as well as posted on the City's website—visit franklinwi.gov for updates.



Answers to Fire & Safety Questions

Question: Can I have a recreational fire in my yard?

Answer: Yes, with dry firewood in a commercial portable fireplace or a stone, metal, or masonry fire ring 25 feet from any combustible overhang or structure and NEVER on a wood deck. NEVER leave fires unattended!

Question: Can I burn yard waste?

Answer: Yes, with a permit from the City Clerk's Office that must be renewed yearly. ONLY dry, combustible leaves and branches may be burned with winds under 9 miles per hour between April 1st and June 15th and between October 15th and November 30th from 7 am until 30 minutes after sunset with a water source near by (i.e. garden hose or water buckets) and continuous supervision by a competent individual, age 16 or older.

Question: How can I walk safely throughout Franklin, where there are no sidewalks?

Answer: Walk on the left side of the road facing traffic, this allows you to see oncoming vehicles earlier and better react to potential hazards. If there is a sidewalk on one side, but not the other, please walk on that sidewalk. Stay visible; wear bright colors, reflective gear, and use a flashlight at night! Get a FREE reflective safety vest from the Franklin Health Department or the Franklin Dispatch window inside the Police Department!

Question: Can I light off fireworks for a party/event?

Answer: Only with an approved Fireworks Display Permit that goes through the City of Franklin Licensing Committee, Franklin Fire Department, and meets code for Fireworks displays.

Moving Franklin Forward

DR. ANNALEE BENNIN, FPS DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR

Over the last year and a half, the community has heard from Franklin Public Schools about the work of **"Franklin Forward."** This was largely related to the 2024 Referendum work around to complete capital improvement projects at our five elementary schools and additions and renovations to Franklin High School. Many of those projects will be underway this summer. FPS has two additional projects to highlight in this *Opening Doors* that will engage our entire community.



- ▶ In March, we saw the addition of a **4-way traffic light at the entrance to Franklin High School on 51st Street.** The light in this location increases safety for our students, staff, and community as it controls traffic through that intersection. It also provides safer crosswalks for pedestrians that cross 51st to get to the high school. Thank you to the City of Franklin for partnering with us on the purchase and installation of this light to create a safer intersection for our entire community.
- ▶ In early April, we were proud to celebrate the **Franklin Community Education & Recreation Center (CERC) Groundbreaking,** adjacent to the ECC District Office. This project, in partnership with **Cadence Consulting, Plunkett Raysich Architects** and **VJS Construction Services,** will see the addition of a recreation center and outdoor athletic fields along West Forest Hill Avenue. The groundbreaking ceremony was attended by city leaders, students, district employees, recreation department staff, and community members. Third grade students from **Southwood Glen Elementary** helped district leaders design the all inclusive playground that will also be on the property. In addition, we were very proud that our **Beyond 18 Transition Services** student run coffee house, "Diverse Grounds" was on hand for the reception serving **Anodyne** coffee and lemonade. This new space will offer two studio spaces, a larger studio with the ability to host pickleball, a community room and a lobby offering capabilities to expand programming for our entire community. The building of the CERC also means that programming that was taking place in schools during the school day can be more safely scheduled in a non-school space. The CERC will open in the Fall of 2025.

2024 ANNUAL WATER QUALITY REPORT

In this report, you will find:

- Information about the source of your drinking water
- The treatment process that ensures you of the highest-quality water
- Results of water-quality testing and compliance with water-quality laws
- Additional educational information

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires drinking water utilities to provide an Annual Water Quality Report (otherwise known as a Consumer Confidence Report) to help consumers understand where their drinking water comes from so they can make informed decisions about their health and protection of the environment.

TREATED WATER QUALITY

Listed on the following pages are contaminants detected in Franklin's drinking water during 2024. All detects are less than what federal and state regulations allow. Not listed are the results of nearly 3,000 tests conducted for approximately 150 contaminants that were not found during water testing.

The State Department of Natural Resources allows the Franklin Water Utility to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Therefore, some of this data, though representative, is more than one year old.

The information enclosed is based on the testing conducted in the year 2024. Testing occurs every year; results for the year 2025 will be available in the next annual report. The Franklin Water Utility is committed to providing its 8,800 customers with the highest-quality drinking water that meets and exceeds standards more stringent than federal and state requirements. Please read this brochure for additional information.

HEALTH INFORMATION

Drinking water, including bottled water, may be reasonably expected to contain small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does *not* necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-4791.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their healthcare providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Exposure to lead in drinking water can cause serious health effects in all age groups. Infants and children can have decreases in IQ and attention span. Lead exposure can lead to new learning and behavior problems or exacerbate existing learning and behavior problems. The children of women who are exposed to lead before or during pregnancy can have increased risk of these adverse health effects. Adults can have increased risks of heart disease, high blood pressure, kidney or nervous system problems.

LEAD AND COPPER

Franklin has no lead piping or lead water-service laterals in our system.

Copper is an essential nutrient, but some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over a relatively short amount of time could experience gastrointestinal distress. Some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over many years could suffer liver or kidney damage. People with Wilson's Disease should consult their personal doctor.

Lead can cause serious health effects in people of all ages, especially pregnant people, infants (both formula-fed and breastfed), and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and parts used in service lines and in home plumbing. Franklin Water Utility is responsible for providing high-quality drinking water and removing lead pipes but cannot control the variety of materials used in the plumbing in your home. Because lead levels may vary over time, lead exposure is possible even when your tap sampling results do not detect lead at one point in time. You can help protect yourself and your family by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Using a filter, certified by an American National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead, is effective in reducing lead exposures. Follow the instructions provided with the filter to ensure the filter is used properly. Use only cold water for drinking, cooking, and making baby formula. Boiling water does not remove lead from water. Before using tap water for drinking, cooking, or making baby formula, flush your pipes for several minutes. You can do this by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. If you have a lead or galvanized service line, you may need to flush your pipes for a longer period. If you are concerned about lead in your water and wish to have your water tested, contact Franklin Water Utility at (414) 421-2581. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available at <https://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>. Lead and copper results are from August 2, 2023.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ON SERVICE LINE MATERIALS

Franklin Water Utility was required to develop an initial inventory of service lines connected to our distribution system by October 16, 2024 and to make the inventory publicly accessible. You can access the service line inventory here <https://www.franklinwi.gov/Departments/Water-Utility.htm>.

DEFINITIONS

AL = Action Level: The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

HA and HAL = HA: Health Advisory. An estimate of acceptable drinking levels for a chemical substance based on health effects information. **HAL: Health Advisory Level** is a concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice. Health Advisories are determined by US EPA.

LRAA = Local Running Annual Average: Highest sample result averaged over a running annual period and not a calendar year.

MCL = Maximum Contaminant Level: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

MCLG = Maximum Contaminant Level Goal: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

MRDL = Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

MRDLG = Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal: The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

nd = No detect

NTU = Nephelometric Turbidity Units

pCi/L = picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)

ppb = parts per billion, or micrograms per liter (ug/l)

ppm = parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/l)

ppt = parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter

PHGS = Public Health Groundwater Standards are found in NR 140 Groundwater Quality. The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice.

RPHGS = Recommended Public Health Groundwater Standards: Groundwater standards proposed by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (WDHS). The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice.

SMCL = Secondary drinking water standards or Secondary Maximum Contaminant Levels for contaminants that affect taste, odor, or appearance of the drinking water. The SMCLs do not represent health standards.

TCR = Total Coliform Rule

Trihalomethanes: Chloroform, bromochloromethane, dibromochloromethane and bromoform.

TT = Treatment Technique: A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

PFAS CONTAMINANTS WITH A RECOMMENDED HEALTH ADVISORY LEVEL

Perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are a large group of human-made chemicals that have been used in industry and consumer products worldwide since 1950. The following table lists PFAS contaminants which were detected in your water and that have a Recommended Public Health Groundwater Standard (RPHGS) or Health Advisory Level (HAL). There are no violations for detections of contaminants that exceed the RPHGS or HAL. The RPHGS are levels at which concentrations of the contaminant present a health risk and are based on guidance provided by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (WDHS).

WATER CONSERVATION

Factors such as drinking water treatment, facility improvements, wastewater treatment, and the energy used for treating, pumping, and heating water are factored into the price that we charge for water. Although tap water is a bargain at \$5.04 per 1,000 gallons when compared to most other products we consume, the total cost of water usage can add up quickly.

We must also remember that water is a limited resource; we will never have any more water on earth than what we have right now. So, while water use is necessary for us to survive and to produce and process most of the products we use on a daily basis, it also pays for us to protect it as a natural resource for use by future generations.

Most water is used in the bathroom. The largest water user in any household is the toilet with 2 to 7 gallons per flush. Flushes account for approximately 27% of the water used in a typical home. Showers, with a flow rate of 2 gallons per minute, account for around 17% of the water used, while other bathroom uses such as baths and faucets account for around 10%. The second highest water user is the washing machine. At around 41 gallons per load, clothes washing accounts for about 22% of the water used in a typical household.
