# City Contracts with Forward Appraisal for 2024 Assessment Services Including Completion of a Citywide Revaluation

The City of Franklin has hired Forward Appraisal, LLC to provide 2024 assessment services, including a comprehensive citywide revaluation. Forward Appraisal, an experienced and licensed assessment firm, is responsible for valuing all real property within the City for tax purposes. Utilizing advanced assessment software, they will ensure fair and equitable assessments across the City by conducting field reviews of a percentage of properties annually.

Forward Appraisal will conduct an accurate and transparent citywide revaluation for the 2024 assessment year, impacting all properties. A revaluation involves reassessing each property record to establish new values, aiming for accuracy and equity in assessments based on market sale prices and comparable amenities. The revaluation will address any inconsistencies and ensure fairness in evaluations.

# Spring Brush & Leaf Pickup: Monday, May 6, 2024



The spring brush and leaf pickup will take place beginning Monday, May 6th. The City's waste hauler will move through the City starting at 7 a.m. on this Monday and work through the week until they are finished. All brush piles and leaves are required to be curbside and next to the driveway by 7 a.m. on Monday, May 6th. Brush and leaves that are not out when the hauler goes by will not be picked up at a later date. Your regular garbage will be picked up on your normal garbage pickup day. Please call 414-425-2592 with any questions.

### Pickup will include:

- Brush (tree limbs, bush cuttings, and similar) must be cut to no longer than 5 feet in length and no larger than 6 inches in diameter, must be piled or tied/bundled (preferred), and placed curbside next to your driveway. Each household is limited to one pile no larger than 4'x4'x5' and be 50 pounds or less. Larger piles, multiple piles, and brush thrown in the ditch will not be picked up.
- LEAVES MUST be in paper compostable yard waste bags or 32-gallon or smaller trash containers weighing 50 pounds or less that can be emptied into the collection truck (no limit on number of bags or containers). Plastic bags of any kind are NOT allowed and will not be picked up. Please place bagged leaves away from your regular trash so they will not be missed. Leaves are not to be raked into the street.

No grass clippings, flowers, stumps, fruit, roots, or other garden debris will be accepted. These items, as well as brush and leaves, may be disposed of at the Waste Management Metro Landfill, 12200 W. South County Line Road (414-529-6180, Hours: Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Saturday, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.).



# **Looking Forward for FPS**

Franklin Forward has consisted of key presentations at our 2023-24 School Board meetings, which can be found on the Franklin Forward webpage.

### These presentations outlined:

- A master facility study, which projects all maintenance needs for our seven schools and the district office over the next decade.
- Projected enrollment growth in Franklin through 2040 to assist the district in identifying capacity issues at existing schools in the future.
- **Guiding principles** developed by the District Leadership team and FPS School Board to ensure we are future focused and provide next level opportunities for our learners, families, staff, and community for decades to come.
- **School finance overview** to share the fiscal responsibility of FPS over the years and how that impacts future borrowing for the district.

In February, we offered community listening sessions for residents to listen, learn and engage around long-range facility planning for Franklin Public Schools. If you were unable to attend, we will be mailing a community-wide survey in April allowing residents to offer feedback on where the FPS School Board should best put their efforts for planning for the future. We encourage you to please complete this 10-minute survey when you receive it. Your input is important to us! It is our hope that, with community support, we can put together a long-range plan so we can continue to provide great educational spaces for our learners now and into the future.

## **Blowing The Whistle On Officials Shortage**

A new class at Franklin High School is working to address the nationwide shortage of athletics officials.

High school sports, recreation departments and youth sports leagues in the area have struggled to find officials at all levels.

This year, FPS began offering two sections of "Officiating Sports" which has 60 students enrolled. The course aims to provide students with training for a potential job while in high school or for a possible career.



"We hope to light a spark in the students in this course to become officials whether it is as a high school student or later on in life," shared instructor Steve Drobot. "Students in this course gain experience officiating in volleyball, baseball, basketball, and a sport of their choice."

The District received a JR NBA grant to fund an online basketball officiating curriculum that guides students through the rules of basketball. The course takes approximately 8.5 hours to complete and includes a variety of videos, quizzes, and call scenarios for the students to learn from. Each student then works to pass the WIAA/NFHS basketball rules exam to become licensed through the WIAA.

As part of this course, local referees Tom Bray (Muskego) and Gregg Dati (Brookfield) came in to provide students with hands-on instruction on applying the mechanics of basketball refereeing. They demonstrated how to call basketball movements and walked students through the motions of officiating a basketball game.

"Being an official is a tough job," added Drobot. "We are hoping this class can help to increase the number of officials available in our community."
