


DID YOU KNOW?



Franklin exceeds in providing bystander CPR before EMS arrival!

Milwaukee County in providing cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) before Emergency Medical Services (EMS) arrive? This occurs when a bystander performs chest compressions on an unresponsive patient who is not breathing.

The National average for someone to receive bystander CPR before EMS arrival is 40%, while Franklin far exceeds that at 46%. This drastically changes someone's survival rate by 3 times. For every minute that goes by, the patient loses a 10% chance of survivability. Your Franklin Fire Department's average response time is just under 5 minutes. When no bystander CPR is done before their arrival, that patient lost 50% of survivability!



Contact the Franklin Fire Department today to schedule a CPR class with their amazing instructors and join the 2,600+ Franklin community members who have received CPR training over the past four years! Seventy percent of cardiac arrests happen in the home; be prepared to help save the life of someone you know or love.

2025 Property Assessment Update


The Assessor's Office will undergo a "maintenance year" in 2025 after conducting a citywide revaluation in 2024. The best way to describe this is that your assessed value will not change from 2024 to 2025 if your property characteristics remain the same. Characteristic changes may include permitted work (a new shed or home remodel), corrections to the property record based on an in-person walkthrough, and property destruction (a building tear-down).

Notices of changed assessment will be mailed in late spring to properties with a change in value. If your property value does not change, you will NOT receive a notice of changed assessment. To confirm your 2025 value, the Open Book assessment roll will be available online in late spring.

For additional information or to check the characteristics of a property, please visit www.franklinwi.gov/assessor.htm; click the blue Property Records button to view a Property Record Card. If you notice anything inaccurate, please contact the Assessor's Office at assessor@franklinwi.gov or 414-425-1416 as soon as possible to verify and make timely corrections as necessary. As a reminder, the scope of the Assessor's Office is property valuation, not taxes. If your property's assessed value does not change during a maintenance year, any change in your December taxes would be due to factors external to the Assessor's Office.

Pleasant View Park Prescribed Burn

The City of Franklin is planning a prescribed burn at Pleasant View Park sometime between March 1 and April 30, 2025, conducted in coordination with the Southeast Wisconsin Chapter of Pheasants Forever



What about safety?

Before the burn is conducted, experienced and trained personnel assess the area to determine the wind direction, speed, relative humidity, grass moisture, and safety requirements. Qualified personnel control fire behavior through the use of comprehensive planning and specialized fire equipment. A burn plan will be prepared and filed with the Fire Department. The Fire Department will be notified before ignition and after all smoke has been extinguished. During the burn, the park will be closed off to the public.

What about smoke?

Smoke emanating from the burn area is not cause for alarm. Smoke control is an important aspect of any prescribed burn plan. Prior to burning, experienced personnel will carefully review the burn area and the proximity of houses, roads, and other smoke-sensitive areas. This information will be incorporated into the burn plan, and the prescribed burn will occur when favorable conditions minimize the amount of smoke reaching these areas.

Spring Brush & Leaf Pickup: Monday, May 5, 2025



The spring brush and leaf pickup will begin Monday, May 5, where the City's waste hauler will move through the City starting at 7 a.m. on this Monday and work through the week until they are finished. All brush piles and leaves must be placed at the curb next to your driveway by 7 a.m. on Monday, May 5. Any brush and leaves that are not out when the hauler passes by will not be picked up later. Your regular garbage will be picked up on your normal garbage pickup day. Please call 414-425-2592 with any questions.

Pickup will include:

- Brush (tree limbs, bush cuttings, and similar) cut to no longer than 5 feet in length and no larger than 6 inches in diameter, must be piled or tied/bundled (preferred), and placed at the curb next to your driveway. Each household is limited to one pile no larger than 4'x4'x5' and be 50 pounds or less. Larger piles, multiple piles, and brush thrown in the ditch will not be picked up.
- Leaves must be in paper compostable yard waste bags or 32-gallon or smaller trash containers weighing 50 pounds or less that can be emptied into the collection truck (no limit on number of bags or containers). Plastic bags of any kind are NOT allowed and will not be picked up. Place bagged leaves away from your regular trash so they won't be missed. Leaves are not to be raked into the street.

No grass clippings, flowers, stumps, fruit, roots, or other garden debris will be accepted. These items, as well as brush and leaves, may be disposed of at the Waste Management Metro Landfill, 12200 W. South County Line Road (414-529-6180, Hours: Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Saturday, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.).







Your Property Tax Breakdown: Understanding the Numbers

To help our residents understand where their tax dollars go, here's an overview of the 2024-2025 property tax landscape, recent school referendums, and the City's tax portion calculation.

School Referendums

Three school referendums that passed in November 2024 significantly impact your tax bill.

Here's the breakdown:

- Franklin School Referendum (2024): This referendum ends in 2044. The total amount is \$145 million with a tax rate of \$1.109 per \$1,000.
- Oak Creek-Franklin School Referendum (2024): This referendum ends in 2030. The total is \$34.3 million and the tax rate is \$0.820 per \$1,000.
- Whitnall School Referendum (2024): This referendum ends in 2044. The total is \$79.1 million and the tax rate is \$2.234 per \$1,000.

How the City's Tax Portion is Calculated

The City's property tax rate in 2024 is \$3.832739 per \$1,000 of assessed value. This rate is determined by dividing the City tax levy by the City's total assessed value and multiplying by 1,000.

Your Tax Dollars Cover the City's:

- Personnel Costs: Accounts for approximately 78-80% of total costs. Utility personnel are not covered by levy dollars, reducing this percentage.
- Operations: Supports essential services, including public safety, administration, and street maintenance.
- Street Improvements: Funds a small portion of the street improvement program.
- Debt Payments: Covers annual debt service obligations.
- Library Services: Supports the majority of the Library's operating budget.

Legal Framework

State law (Sec. 66.0602, Wis. Statutes) limits municipalities' ability to increase property taxes. Increases are capped at the net new construction percentage unless a referendum is approved. Exceptions include servicing debt, funding transfers, or voter-approved increases. These rules ensure responsible taxation while allowing flexibility for community needs.




