## From the Mayor's Office

Dear Neighbors: Welcome to fall in Franklin. We have a lot planned for the rest of the year for the City both in family fun activities and City business.

Last year we held our first Christmas Parade and unified holiday celebration. Plans are underway for an even bigger parade and celebration this year. Our Civic Celebrations Commission is now the lead planner and they will be announcing all of the details soon. The Library and Health Department, along with Volition Franklin, will again be hosting their Halloween "Trunk or Treat" festivities. Look for details on these events in this newsletter and on the City website.

The City is beginning our annual budget process. You have already received your assessment notices earlier this summer. The AVERAGE residential assessment went up approximately 10.3%. I expect that our budget will hold the line, which means that if your assessment didn't increase more than the 10.3% you can expect your City of Franklin taxes to remain approximately the same as the previous year. For the past many years, the Common Council and I have worked hard to keep any spending increases LESS than what is allowed by state law, limiting the increase to what is paid for by new growth. My goal and that of the Council is to maintain that practice, which effectively stabilizes local taxes. Please see page 4 of this newsletter for additional information regarding my 2023 budget proposal.

Development is strong in the City. We had more than \$65 million in net new construction this past year; new homes and new subdivisions, as well as new commercial and manufacturing in the Business Park all contributed to this growth. This fall will see Neumann Homes begin construction on their 130-lot subdivision on Ryan Road near the Muskego border. Bear Development will also begin work on their 26 condominium units between Loomis Road and Ryan Road. And, Fiduciary Development will begin their 265 market rate apartments on 27th Street, near Ascension Hospital. Our business parks are growing; Wangard Partners, Saputo Cheese, and HSA Commercial are all building in the new Corporate Park on 27th Street and Oakwood Road, adding more than 1,100,000 square feet of manufacturing/flex property and approximately \$85 million in new tax base.

This summer we tried using a different process for road repair called "chip sealing" on a couple roads. This process will extend the life of the road for about a decade yet costs far less than 10% of reconstruction. We will continue to monitor this new initiative to determine if it will be continued into the future.

## Fire Away: Answers to Fire & Emergency Related Questions



#### What is the number one cause of house fires?

The number one cause of house fires is unattended cooking with a national average of 470 cooking fires a day. Be attentive, keep an eye on children, and have an extinguisher in your kitchen. Never put water on a cooking fire, use an extinguisher or baking soda!

#### What should I do if I experience a minor burn?

Immediately run the burn under "cool" water for several minutes. Do not use ice, iced water, or any creams or greasy substances such as butter on the burn. Remove rings or other tight items from the burned area. Do not break any blisters and apply a nonstick, sterile bandage over the burn.

#### What if I experience a fire in my home?

Call 911 immediately, have an escape route preplanned, have a meeting spot to meet once out, and NEVER go back inside! October 9-15, 2022 is Fire Prevention Week, the 100th Year Celebration of awareness with this year's focus being, "Fire won't wait. Plan your escape." In the month of October, the Franklin Fire Department (FFD) will educate elementary school students on the importance of having an escape plan. #### How can I be prepared for a medical emergency?

Keep important medical and demographic information handy; the FFD can help by supplying File of Life patient information forms to members of the community. Educate yourself, your family members, and your friends by attending a First Aid, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), and Automated External Defibrillator (AED) course.

#### What is CPR, is this something I should know how to do?

Lives can be saved if more people know CPR and how to use an AED. CPR is an emergency lifesaving skill performed when the heart stops beating. Seventy percent (70%) of out-of-hospital cardiac arrests happen in the home, with more than 350,000 occurring each year out-of-hospital. This means you will most likely be trying to save the life of someone you love. Be prepared to help them! Immediate CPR can double or triple the chances of survival after cardiac arrest and anyone can learn CPR!

## What is this AED everyone talks about and I see at sporting events, schools, and public buildings?

An AED is an Automated External Defibrillator that greatly increases a cardiac arrest victim's chances of survival. It is a device that when turned on walks a person through step-by-step instructions on what to do once the machine is turned on.

## What if I don't know how to use an extinguisher or would like to learn more about First Aid, CPR, and AEDs?

The FFD offers a variety of classes to the public free of charge. All classes are scheduled at various times to accommodate your normal day-to-day schedule. Learn CPR, AED, Extinguisher, or First Aid training with your local fire department! These free classes can be taught to all ages and are for all Franklin residents or anyone that works or goes to school in the City of Franklin. 
## **Special Needs Registry**

The Franklin Police Department (FPD) recognizes that some members of our community may have special needs or may react a little different when they come in contact with someone unfamiliar to them, such as a police officer or firefighter, especially when involved in traumatic events. With that in mind, the FPD has created a Special Needs Registry, which can be completed with information that will help them have a more informed response.

The Special Needs Registry is available for all ages, whether the condition is physical, emotional, or medical. The FPD has found this to be especially helpful for families with autistic children and those caring for the elderly who have Alzheimer's or dementia.

## City of Franklin 2023 Annual Budget

Mayor Steve Olson is finalizing his City of Franklin Recommended 2023 Budget, which will be released in late September or the beginning of October. Once released, it is expected that the Common Council will refer the proposed 2023 budget to the Finance Committee, who is scheduled to hold budget review meetings on October 3rd, October 5th, October 6th, and October 11th, all starting at 4 p.m., to review the budget in detail. The Finance Committee will then present its recommendations to the Common Council in mid-October.

Additional budget meetings may be scheduled as needed, so please check the City calendar at www.franklinwi.gov for further information. A public hearing and final consideration of the budget are scheduled for the Common Council Meeting on Tuesday, November 15th, beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers at City Hall.

All budget related meetings provide a 'citizen comment period' where citizens are encouraged to provide input and/or ask questions. Questions regarding the budget may also be directed to Peggy Steeno, Director of Administration, at psteeno@franklinwi.gov.

## Fall Open Burning-Permits Required

Fall open burning of leaves, brush, and garden refuse is allowed in the City of Franklin from October 15 through November 30 with a permit. Open Burning Permits are issued to owners of one and two-family residential properties and allows



and two-family residential properties and allows burning in accordance with Chapter 133 of the Franklin Municipal Code.

Burning permits are \$15 and can be obtained at the City Clerk's Office Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. For questions, please contact the Franklin Fire Department at 414-425-1420 or the Clerk's Office at 414-425-7500.

## **Fall Brush & Leaf Pickups**

Two (2) Fall brush and leaf pickups will take place beginning Monday, October 17th, and Monday, November 14th. The City's waste hauler will move through the City starting at 7 a.m. on these designated Mondays and work through the week until



they are finished. All brush piles and leaves are required to be curbside and next to the driveway by 7 a.m. on the above listed dates. Brush and leaves that are not out when the hauler goes by will not be picked up at a later date. Your regular garbage will be picked up on your normal garbage pickup day. Please call 425-2592 with any questions.

### Pick-up will include:

- Brush (tree limbs, bush cuttings, and similar) cut to no longer than 5 feet in length and no larger than 6 inches in diameter and must be piled or tied/bundled (preferred) and placed curbside next to your driveway. Each household is limited to one pile no larger than 4'x4'x5' and be 50 pounds or less. Larger piles, multiple piles, or brush thrown in ditch will not be picked up.
- Leaves MUST be in paper compostable yard waste bags or 32-gallon or smaller trash containers weighing 50 pounds or less that can be emptied into the collection truck (no limit on number of bags or containers). Plastic bags of any kind are NOT allowed and will not be picked up. Please place bagged leaves away from your regular trash so they will not be missed. Leaves are not to be raked into the street.
- No grass clippings, flowers, stumps, fruit, roots, or other garden debris will be accepted. These items, as well as brush and leaves, may be disposed of at the Waste Management Metro Landfill, 12200 W. South County Line Road (529-6180, Hours: Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Saturday, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.).


## **Buckthorn Survey Results**
