
Officer Activity

The Franklin Police Department patrol officers respond to a wide variety of emergency and non-emergency calls for service. They respond to crime reports, crimes in progress, traffic crashes, and many non-crime calls for service, such as medical emergencies and mental health crises. When not dispatched to calls, patrol officers enforce traffic laws and city ordinances, patrol problem areas, serve arrest warrants, and engage in many other services throughout the community.




Traffic Activity

The Franklin Police Department police officers proactively enforce state and local traffic and parking laws and ordinances. Through their dedication to our community, they are a key piece in keeping our Franklin roads safer and free of obstructions to ensure our Franklin residents and visitors can freely travel throughout the city.



Communications

Our department is fortunate to have its own dispatch center within the city. This ensures higher quality and more personal service is provided to our residents along with visitors of our city who need to interact with the Franklin Police Department. In 2024, through the hard work and dedication from the Franklin Police Department Dispatch Team, they have fielded thousands of calls for service that ranged from local retail theft to large building fires.

Specialty Units



The dedicated members of the Franklin Police Department help keep our community safe by attending special training and utilizing these learned skills on specialty units within the Franklin Police Department. The specialty units are used for unique calls for service within the community.

Our specialty units have been assisting the community since our department's inception, and in 2024 some units experienced new team members as well as new equipment to better serve our community.

Specialty Units at a Glance - SWAT



The National Defense Authorization Act was passed by the US Congress which authorized the transfer of excess DOD property to federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies (The US LESO 1033 Program).

This federal program has afforded the Franklin Police and Fire Department the opportunity to obtain a donated decommissioned military vehicle called the MRAP (Mine-Resistant Ambush Protected). This vehicle was obtained in late 2024 and will be utilized by both departments for calls for service that require an armored vehicle to keep first responders and civilians safe in a high risk situation.



Specialty Units at a Glance - UAS



The Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS) also referred to as the Drone Unit, has been utilized in 10 documented deployments where the Franklin Police Officer Pilot flew the drone for photos or videos of cases. This number does not include the plethora of calls for service within or outside of Franklin where a drone was utilized to search and locate missing persons, suspects fleeing from law enforcement, and evidence that may be needed for a call for service.

The Franklin Police Department ensures specialty equipment is up-todate and within budget. The UAS Unit was able to purchase two new drones, the DJI Avata 1 & 2. The addition of these drones ensures Franklin Police Officer Pilots are able to fly drones within residences and

outdoors.



Specialty Units at a Glance - Motor Unit

The Motorcycle "Motor" Unit members' primary duties are traffic enforcement, accident investigation, and escort duties for parades, dignitaries and funerals.

The Franklin Police Department Motor Unit, participated in a motorcade to protect visitors of Franklin with their travels to downtown Milwaukee for the Republican National Convention. This is just one example of many where our Motor Unit was a model of professionalism and helped improve the quality of life for Franklin residents and visitors.








Specialty Units at a Glance Drug Recognition

A Drug Recognition Expert, "DRE", is skilled in detecting and identifying persons under the influence of drugs and in identifying the category or categories of drugs causing the impairment. DRE's assist in impaired driving investigations, motor vehicle crashes resulting in serious injury and/or death, and investigations where alcohol/drug intoxication is an element of the offense.

The Drug Recognition Unit added two new members in 2024. Police Officer Ryan Thompson and Police Officer James Malkowski. Not only did both undertake rigorous training to earn this title, but Officer Thompson was a model for the law enforcement community by earning the title of Valedictorian for the DRE Fall Class of 2024.

Not to mention, DRE PO Jedd Miller earned his 20th Year Award of serving as a DRE and SGT Sean Patyk earned the 2024 DRE Excellence Award.





Auxiliary Unit

The Franklin Police Department is proud to have a dedicated group of Franklin resident volunteers who dedicate countless hours of their time to our Franklin community. The purpose of the Auxiliary Unit is to augment the services that our police department provides to the community by ensuring the safety of residents and visitors at sporting events, the Civic Celebration, St. Martins Fair, and a plethora of other events held within our community.



Special Events



Throughout the year, members of the Franklin Police Department lead by example by being active in their daily duties, but also volunteer within the community they serve. Personnel participate in several events including: Shop with a Cop, the Milwaukee Homeless Veterans Blanket Event, National Night Out, Women's Self-Defense, and Games with a Cop.

Citizen Academy 2024


